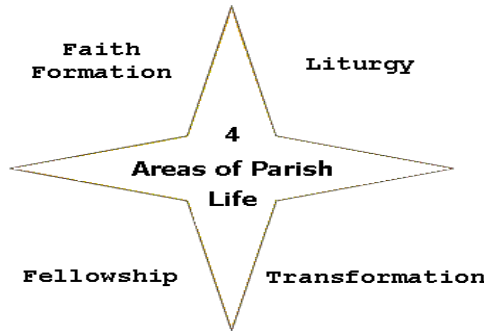

**3<sup>rd</sup> SUNDAY OF LENT – MARCH 11<sup>th</sup>, 2012 - THE MEANING OF MORTIFICATION**

**Truly following Christ implies practicing a life of mortification and being close to the Cross.**  
*To be a disciple of Our Lord one needs to follow his measured words of advice: If any man would come after me, let him deny himself, take up his cross and follow me. It is not possible to follow Our Lord without the Cross. Jesus words are relevant in all ages, since they are directed to each and every man, for he who does not bear his own cross and come after me cannot be my disciple. To take up the cross – the acceptance of sorrow and of the contradictions God permits for our purification, the costly fulfillment of our duties. Christian mortification voluntarily accepted – is the indispensable condition for following the Master.*

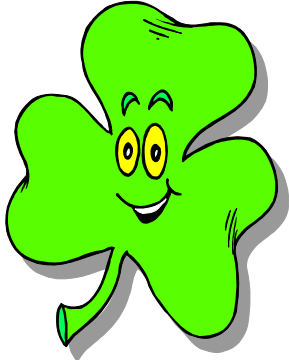

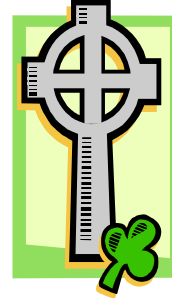

### Walking the Walk - A Lenten Thought

Through various writings and teachings, the life of Jesus has been described to us in many forms. However, it is a story with a common theme:

- ✓ born in a manger of parents of relatively modest means;
- ✓ simple shepherds were witnesses to his birth;
- ✓ in his early days he was a carpenter by trade, a man who worked with his hands;
- ✓ we are told his tastes and lifestyle were simple; and
- ✓ for the first 33 years of his life, he worked and lived in a small village.

Jesus' teachings were often directed towards the plight of the poor, the oppressed, the sick and the elderly. His message was one of love – loving your neighbour as yourself. This was pronounced by Jesus as the second most important commandment.

Some of Jesus' most telling pronouncements are found in the Beatitudes as follows:

- ✓ Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the earth.
- ✓ Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be filled.
- ✓ Blessed are the merciful, for they will receive mercy.
- ✓ Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God.
- ✓ Blessed are those who are persecuted for righteousness sake, for theirs is the kingdom of God.

There is a common thread to most of Jesus' teachings around social justice, respect for others and assisting the less fortunate. **If you hold to my teachings, you are really my disciples. (John 8:31)**

His message is calling for us, as Christians, to think outside the walls of the church. Thinking outside the walls can mean many things including playing an activist role in the community at large. On many occasions, Jesus has stated his desire for each one of us to be compassionate with one another and especially with those in material, physical and spiritual need. So how as a community can we accomplish this?

We can respond by providing the OLV church hall to such self-help groups as Narcotics, Alcoholics and Over-Eaters Anonymous. By allowing them to pay a minimum amount of rent and if they can't afford to do so, provide the hall for free. We believe it is our responsibility to help those trying to help themselves. Both parishes work with La Maison de La Famille by helping individuals who find themselves without furniture, groceries, clothes or other necessities.

Many parishioners find it hard to believe that there are people in this community who find themselves on the street with virtually nothing. A fact that parishioners may not know is that the Buckingham sector is one of the poorest sectors in the City of Gatineau.

Each week, parishioners from both parishes donate a wide range of non-perishable food and cereal bars for distribution to the local food bank, soup kitchen and the elementary school. These goods provide needed support for families, individuals and school children.

At Christmas time, parishioners from both parishes generously support the Lions Club annual Christmas basket campaign. As well, OLV financially supports a community group that provides a Christmas meal for those who find themselves alone or who can't afford a meal. Christmas is a lonely time for many people and this initiative has become very popular over the past few years.

So during this Lenten season, let us be especially conscious of the needs of others and continue to act accordingly. Let us bring hope and compassion to our brothers and sisters in need. **Lord, help me give of myself in little ways, so that helping others becomes a habit.**
