

**Reading 1** Genesis 9.8-15  
**Responsorial Psalm** Your paths, Lord, are love and faithfulness for those who keep your covenant.  
**Reading II** 1 Peter 3.18-22  
**Gospel** Mark 1.12-15

## OUR MOUNTAIN CLIMBING TOWARDS EASTER (Continued)

How will we mark our 40-day trek to Easter? The traditional Lenten practices of prayer, fasting and almsgiving are very commendable. Some may argue, didn't we get rid of most of the rules about Lenten discipline? Yes, that is true, but it makes a lot of sense to still observe the practices, as long as we keep in mind what they are aiming at: to get us in shape for **Easter**.

**Prayer:** Our Sunday liturgies, with their rich Bible readings, provide the basic orientation for Lent. How about making a special effort to read them again in the course of the week? Perhaps doing it as a family.

**Fasting:** During Lent, we normally refrain from some food, a drink, a party, from a movie. We can do this as a gesture of solidarity with so many of those in our world who have no choice in these matters for the simple reason that they do not have them. We can also make these sacrifices for ourselves, showing that we can distance ourselves from so much of our consumer society.

**Almsgiving:** This flows naturally from the previous two practices. Almsgiving says we care for others even to the point of depriving ourselves from something. How about we put the money that we save by some form of fasting aside and make it into our contributions to the **Development and Peace Share Lent** collection on the 5<sup>th</sup> Sunday of Lent.

## WELCOMING, A JOURNEY TOWARDS EASTER

We started our Lenten voyage on Ash Wednesday. As noted in previous bulletins, **Free the Gift, Share the Word** has been chosen as the theme for the Diocesan Pastoral Priorities for 2014-2017. For year one, the focus is on welcoming. The Archbishop has suggested that we celebrate this Lenten season under a common banner - **"Welcoming, A Journey towards Easter."** Part of this journey includes the singing of the theme composed by the Archbishop, **"Teach us, Loving God."** Copies of the hymn can be found at the entrance.

The Gospel readings for the five Sundays of Lent this year really lend themselves well to an ongoing reflection on the role of welcoming in a Christian life. Each Sunday there will be a paragraph in the bulletin reflecting on the readings to assist parishioners with their special Lenten prayer intentions

### 1<sup>st</sup> SUNDAY – WELCOMING, A WAY OF CONVERSION

Jesus proclaims that the times are fulfilled, that the Kingdom of God is at hand, and that we should be converted. To be converted means to change our hearts. Welcoming is the first step in such a conversion, for we must begin by welcoming the Word of God as a transforming Word. And our answer must include the decision to welcome those around us: this is a necessary step in living out the Kingdom of justice, peace and joy that Jesus came to inaugurate among us.

Profits for the evening were \$502.

### Gas Conversion Project

The Diocese has approved the Parish's plan to convert its oil-based heating system to a gas-based system. The successful bid was submitted by Alpha Combustible. The total value of the bid is \$24,580 plus tax, with work commencing in the spring. The cost of heating resulting from this conversion is expected to be \$11,000 per year. Last year our oil bill was \$28,000. Based on the projected savings from gas, our investment will be recovered within a year and a half. As construction commences, we will keep parishioners updated on progress.
