

"For the eradication of human trading, a modern form of slavery"

Social reflection: Human trading is a major problem, affecting 12.3 million people worldwide. Very often, the victims of this trade are the most vulnerable in our society, e.g. recent immigrants; as well, 59%^[1] of victims are women. The plight of these people can truly be compared to slavery. Men are forced, often under threat of death, to do back-breaking work in very dangerous conditions for relatively little pay. But for women, it can get even worse, especially if they're forced into the sex trade. Then, they are marketed as 'escorts', and rented out to men during international events, such as Formula 1 car races, or major conferences and meetings. And beware if they don't `satisfy the client`; the consequences could be quite serious. In 2005, following Sweden's example, the Government of Canada changed the Criminal Code, so that the pimp and the john are the ones punished for sex crimes, and not the prostitute.

<u>Answering our faith:</u> As with the Swedish example, our Christian faith invites us not to judge others. As humans and Christians, we must condemn human trading, since no one has the right to exercise absolute control over another person. Following Jesus' example, we are invited not to judge people, but to reject evil in all its forms. Individually, or as a Christian community, what should be our attitude when it comes to human trading?

OUR THANKSGIVING PROJECT – Part 2

As indicated in last week's bulletin, the Transformation Committee is dedicating the month of October to a food drive for our local food bank, *La mie de l'entraide*.

There is something new at the food bank on Pine Street – an "anti-waste fridge" outside the main door is available to collect surplus fruits and vegetables from farmers, community gardens, grocers and citizens. Anyone can then anonymously take from this "fridge" whatever they need. This is one of three fridges in the Outaouais and will remain outside the entrance until the end of October. The Director General of *La Mie de l'entraide*, David Reny, is looking into the possibility of making such a fridge available year round.

La mie de l'entraide also provides home-made meals as well as non-perishables to those who visit the food bank. Whenever they receive large quantities of different items from local grocers, volunteers use such food to make meals which are then frozen and distributed along with the non-perishables. La mie de l'entraide is the only food bank in the Outaouais that provides perishable items such as meat, milk, eggs, fruits and vegetables. There are also items for sale to the general public, such as meat pies, apple pies, etc.

During our October food drive, baskets marked with *La mie de l'entraide* will be left at the entrance of both churches. The food bank will also provide tax receipts for any donations over \$10.

Daily Bread Program & Our Thanksgiving Project

Parishioners from both parishes are being asked to support two Thanksgiving projects by donating food items in support of the local food bank and by donating food items and supplies in support of the Daily Bread Program at the Buckingham Elementary School. Needed items were outlined in last week's bulletin. For the rest of the month, separate baskets with listings will be available in both churches to accept donations.
