THE ARCHBISHOP'S MONTHLY PRAYER INTENTIONS: JULY 2016

"May the Native people be respected in their identity and their very existence"

Social reflection: In Canada and in many other countries, the Aboriginal issue is headline news. Even if the Native people aided the European explorers when they arrived in the "New World", the Europeans in return did not feel the same desire for co-operation with the Native people. And today, several consequences have arisen from this painful history. We only need to think of the more than 1200 women and girls who have disappeared and are still missing. Also, the problems related to living in reservations: bad drinking water, insufficient education of children, alcohol dependency, residential schools, etc. A year ago, the Reconciliation and Truth Commission tabled a report with 94 recommendations. As citizens and Christians, what can we do?

Our faith response: The problems linked to Native people are due to the European and Christian views of the world. Unfortunately, our evangelization practices were not always done in the image, or according to the teachings of, Christ. However, the mentalities of Christian churches have changed with time. Take, for example, the voyages of Pope John Paul II to Canada in 1984 and 1987; he came bearing a political message favourable to the Native people. Even Pope Francis defends, through his messages and his voyages, Native people in many countries of the world. During a conference by Development and Peace, Mrs. Jennifer Henry, General Director of KAIROS¹, talked about our relationship with Native people. She stated: "As Christians, we must remove ourselves from the colonizing mentality, and thus decolonize ourselves".² Are we still colonizers in our thoughts and our actions? How do we get out of this mentality?

<u>Reflection Sunday</u>, July 3, 2016</u>: This week, I reflect on how the Native people were evangelized. Did we offer them the love of Christ, or did we simply impose the European culture on them?

<u>Religious Articles and Old Bibles:</u> Several individuals have contacted the Parishes regarding what to do with religious articles and old Bibles that have been stored away for years. In some instances, inquiries have been made about the possibility of presenting / donating them to the Parishes. This is a non-starter, as the Parishes have more than their share of articles and are not prepared to accept more.

So, the question remains – what to do? According to our research, a common pious custom is to dispose of blessed objects by either burning them (if they are flammable) or burying them (if they are not). In the former case, the object is destroyed and the ashes (or other remains) can simply be thrown away. In the case of objects that were never blessed, they can simply be thrown away like any other non-blessed object.

<u>Shut-Ins</u>: Parishioners are reminded that Father Albanus is available and more than willing to meet with those individuals who are shut-in for a variety of reasons. In addition to Eucharist, Father is prepared to simply visit, as well as bring a spiritual message to those who are unable to leave their place of residence.
