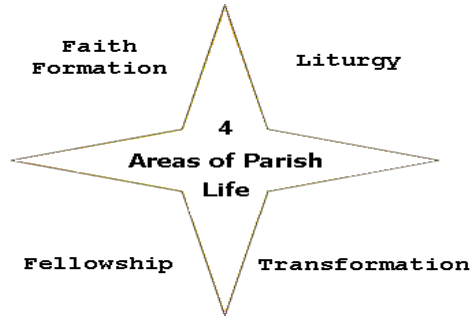

## **FATHER ALBANUS REFLECTIONS on the SUNDAY LITURGY for JULY 21-22**

### **Jesus, the Good Shepherd**

Today's scriptural readings speak of God who, like a Good Shepherd, redeems His people and provides for them. We are called to imitate God by using our God-given authority in the family, in the church and in the society, with fidelity and responsibility. The **first reading** is from the Prophet Jeremiah who lived during a very difficult period in the history of his people. Here, he strongly speaks against Israel's careless leaders – the kings, some priests and some court prophets - for showing no concern for the poor. He foretells the rise of a good, new shepherd in the family line of David, a wise king, who will be just and upright and will foster justice on the earth. He gives a message of hope to exiled Israelites that God will not abandon them and will lead them back to their original pasture in Israel from whence they were taken by violence. The prophecy is fulfilled in Jesus, the promised "shepherd", who did not reestablish a kingdom of this world or subject people by the force of arms; He transformed their hearts. Today's psalm affirms David's as well as our faith and trust in God, the Good Shepherd.

In the **second reading**, Paul introduces Jesus as the Shepherd for both the Jews and the Gentiles. He was speaking to the baptized Christians who have recently been converted from pagans. The reading also explains how Jesus, the Good Shepherd, reconciled all of us with His Father by offering Himself on the cross. Jesus also reconciled the Jews and the Gentiles by accepting both into the same Christian brotherhood. As Christians, we are called to be witnesses to this unity and peace among the nations. Like Jesus, we ought to break the barriers of nationality, race, tribe, culture and behavior. We must show the world that the love of Christ is capable of breaking down all these walls that separate us. Our baptism cancels all those laws and traditions that, in one way or another, foster hostility, suspension, and prejudice. We have embraced the law of love which makes us see in every person a brother or a sister to love and serve. Today's **Gospel** continues our reading of Mark's Gospel. Mark presents Jesus as the Good Shepherd, fulfilling God's promise given through His Prophet Jeremiah in the first reading. Jesus attends to His weary apostles and expresses His concern for the people, for they are like sheep with a shepherd.

Like the apostles, we ought to first learn from the Master, the Good Shepherd, what we are supposed to do and should go to Him again and ask him to assess the work we have done. We need to be in constant touch with the Lord through prayers and meditation. What we do should be examined in the light of the Gospel. When our community does not stop short to consider with the Master the initiatives we are taking, it will inevitably follow human logic and judges its activity only in terms of prestige, success, statistics, conquests and honours. The crowd comes to Jesus from every side cutting short their rest. Thus, the community that has been comparing itself with its master will immediately find the crowds waiting for it, crowds that are like "sheep without a shepherd" - an expression Moses used too in Number 27:17, while praying for the leader to be sent by God. The evangelist is therefore telling us that Jesus is that leader sent by God in answer to the prayer of Moses. Jesus' attitude to the crowd is a lesson for us all. . How do we feel for others, in the suffering, anxiety and error? We should be moved with compassion rather than get impatient with them or condemn them. Jesus was never aggrieved; He was well disposed to stay with and talk with people and try to understand the problems and anxieties of the people. We should imitate Christ by trying to meet the social and material needs of our brothers and sisters as individuals and as a community. **Happy Sunday!**
