

Fr. Albanus' Reflections on the Sunday Liturgy

The Good Shepherd and the Good Sheep

Today, the fourth Sunday of Easter is always celebrated as the Good Shepherd Sunday. It is also World Day of Prayer for Vocations. In the Old Testament (OT), the image of the Shepherd is often applied to God as well as the leaders of the people. The prophet Ezekiel represents Yahweh severally as a Shepherd. Isaiah (40:11) speaks of Him the same way. We all know about the popular Psalm 23 where Yahweh is described as the shepherd. We reflect on the image of Jesus as the Good Shepherd. As a Good Shepherd, Jesus devotedly and kindly takes care of His flock. A good shepherd leads, feeds, nurtures, comforts and protects his flock. Expectedly today's readings speak of the role of the Shepherds of God's flock. The **first reading** starts with the account of the first missionary journey of Paul and Barnabas. It describes how they opted to listen to the voice of Jesus the Good Shepherd and follow Him, and how, like their Master they were rebuffed and rejected when they tried to share the good news of salvation. As shepherds, Paul and Barnabas extended their care to the Gentiles, something that did not go down well with the Jews who were convinced that the promises and blessings were reserved only for their people alone. That is not true though.

The **second reading** presents Jesus as both the Glorified Lamb and the Shepherd. John in his vision saw the multitude dressed in "white robes" with "palm branches" in their hands. The white robe is the symbol of joy and innocence and the palms are the symbol of victory. These are those who in this world went through sufferings, persecutions and gave their lives for their brothers like the Lamb. In this passage, written to urge persecuted Christians to persevere patiently, John encourages us that if we have ever followed Christ, the Good Shepherd, and led others to Him we will share everlasting life with Him. In the **Gospel**, Jesus calls himself the Good Shepherd. He is the expected liberator announced by the prophets, the prophet that would lead the people along the paths of justice and fidelity to the Lord. Jesus is like a seasoned, strong shepherd who fights off bandits and wild beasts, lays down His life for the flock He loves (Jn. 10:11). In today's passage, Jesus offers us comfort as well as a great challenge. No one, He says, can snatch the sheep out of His Father's hand. But as His sheep, we must hear his voice and follow Him. His good sheep are those who have the courage to follow Him in laying down His life for the brothers and sisters. It is not easy to trust Jesus since He does not promise success, triumph, and victories as other shepherds do. He demands suffering, self-denial, even the laying down of one's life. Yet He assures us, this is the only way that leads to eternal life; there are no shortcuts!

Who are the shepherds? Pastors! Yes, but not only them. Anyone entrusted with the care of others is a shepherd. Hence parents, teachers, doctors, nurses, government officials as well as school mates and work colleagues etc., are shepherds in their own ranks. The mother who patiently bears with suffering and pain is a shepherd; the father who teaches his children how to forgive, to reconcile and to share is a shepherd too. We are good shepherds when we love those entrusted to us, pray for them, invest our talents for their welfare and guard them from physical and spiritual dangers. As good sheep, we must hear and follow the voice of our shepherds; we pray for our shepherds, encourage them by offering constructive criticisms to them when needed. Today we are called to pray for vocations to priesthood and religious life.
