

Second Sunday of Lent - March 13, 2022

First Reading: Genesis 15.5-12, 17-18

Psalm 27: The Lord is my light and my salvation

Second Reading: Philippians 3.17-4.1

Gospel: Luke 9.28b-36

Reflection

Jesus is on his way to Jerusalem. He has the sense that things are coming to a head for him. The conflict between himself and his enemies is at the point of exploding. A number of his disciples have left him. He wonders whether he should go through with the mission the Father had given him.

"He went up on the mountain to pray" – He went into communication with God. Two "giants" of the Old Testament, Moses and Elijah (the Law and the Prophets), appear on the scene. Both of them had faced similarly critical situations. As for Elijah, he is the man who, very much like Jesus, had only one passion: the Kingdom of God. Elijah met a lot of resistance, so much so that he went into the wilderness, sat under a tree saying "God, I have had enough. Let me go to sleep and don't let me wake up again." But he wakes up. Something drives him to go to Mount Horeb where he has an overwhelming experience of God, one that energizes him enough to go on again.

As for Moses, he too met all sorts of difficulties with the people he was supposed to lead: resistance, scepticism, rebellion, enough to be tempted to throw in the towel. So Moses pleads with God to show the way. He goes up the Mount of Sinai where he experiences the presence of God so profoundly, that he can get over his crisis. He can hope again, he can move on.

It is precisely these, Moses and Elijah, that appear on the scene when things are getting difficult for Jesus. He has to consult them. Talking things over with them, it becomes clear to Jesus that he is on course. He is encouraged by their story. Above all, he finds strength in God's presence, like they did.

The Bible captures that with the image of his face changing and his clothes becoming brilliant. And from the cloud that covers them comes the voice: "This is my Son, the Chosen One, Listen to Him." These same words had sounded at an earlier decisive moment in Jesus' life, at his baptism in the Jordan when he begins his mission. Here too the voice coming from the cloud confirms Jesus. Now he is equipped and strengthened to go on his way to Jerusalem, where in laying down his life he will become the source of life for us.

God's presence to Moses, Elijah, and Jesus pulled them through their difficult moments. That same God has also made himself into our God, when we were baptized in Jesus' name. It is important that we bring that home to us in the season of Lent. Lent is the privileged time in which we are encouraged to check out whether we are still on course as God's people.

We may not have the serious doubts that Moses, Elijah and Jesus had. In our case it may be a matter of discipleship having become half-hearted, lukewarm, too comfortable. Perhaps our discipleship has lost some of its intensity. So the season of Lent becomes an opportunity to ask ourselves honestly: As disciples of Jesus are we still on course? Do the basic Gospel values that Jesus embodies still turn us on? Or have we possibly lost the taste for them?

Madagascar: An Ecological Village to Cope With Climate Change



Development and Peace's **People and Planet First** campaign celebrates what solidarity can achieve, even against seemingly impossible odds.

In Madagascar, for instance, Development and Peace's partner, the Development Council of Andohatapenaka (CDA), empowers people to manage and transform their neighbourhoods.

In the capital region, which is afflicted by flooding and poor waste management, CDA has helped the residents of one vulnerable area to turn their environs into a thriving ecological village. Today, each of the 50 households involved in the project has a vegetable garden, a stove and solar panels. This transformation reflects a true ecological conversion.
