

Third Sunday of Lent - March 20, 2022

First Reading: Exodus 3.1-8a, 13-15

Psalm 103: The Lord is merciful and gracious

Second Reading: Corinthians 10.1-6, 10-12

Gospel: Luke 13.1-9

Reflection

First reading, how it all began. The story of Moses' call, vocation. The burning bush: the Bible's way of trying to capture the presence of the all-holy God in the life of Moses.

The bush was not consumed .., but Moses was consumed by God calling him for an extraordinary mission: The liberation of God's people from slavery in Egypt.

God identifies himself as the God of the promise ... the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob (Moses' ancestors). God speaking to Moses: "I have observed the misery of my people who are in Egypt; I have heard their cry on account of their taskmasters. Indeed, I know their sufferings, and I have come down to deliver them from the Egyptians, and to bring them up out of that land, to a good and broad land, a land flowing with milk and honey." In other words, God makes a pledge. God will not stand for it, that his people are oppressed and enslaved. God will set his people free – God as the liberator.

Then, a surprising turn in the rhetoric, captured in vs. 9-12, unfortunately left out of the Lectionary reading: "The cry of the Israelites has now come to me. I have also seen how the Egyptians oppress them. So come, I will send you to Pharaoh to bring my people, the Israelites, out of Egypt," But Moses said to God, "Who am I that I should go to Pharaoh, and bring the Israelites out of Egypt?" He said, "I will be with you; and this shall be the sign for you that it is I who sent you: when you have brought the people out of Egypt, you shall worship God on this mountain." (vs. 9-12). As for the turn in the rhetoric: so far God has uttered first-person pronouns: I have observed ... I have heard the people's cry. I have come to deliver my people. And then God addresses Moses: Come, I will send you to Pharaoh to bring my people, the Israelites, out of Egypt. Basically, what God says is "I will do it, but you go."

The glorious things that God has resolved to do are now assigned to Moses as human work, dangerous human work. Quite often in the Bible: God enlists and recruits human agents to do the things that God has promised. The resolve of God would not amount to much without the risky courage of Moses. Yes, Moses objects; he does not feel adequate. God basically says to Moses: your adequacy is not the issue; I will be with you.

Other Moses figures, Martin Luther King, Nelson Mandela and above all, for us: Jesus Christ ... as the new Moses. He is God's chosen servant through whom God set us free from every form of slavery, from sin, from death ...

We are disciples, followers of that new Moses, Jesus Christ. The Lenten season is the grace-filled season in which we apply a reality check to God's summons to us. In and through Jesus Christ we are enlisted in the work of peace and justice, love and care for all oppressed people, and for the salvation of our world. The Lenten material of Development and Peace gives us direction.
